This weekend we observe the fourth Sunday of Lent and we focus on the famous Gospel passage from John about God's wondrous love. During this season, we are reminded that, again and again, suffering and brokenness find us, and we need God's love and grace. The story of the Cross plays itself out again and again in our world, but again and again, God breaks the cycle and offers us a new way forward.

In our gospel lesson from John, after inviting Nicodemus to be born anew, Jesus tells him that "God so loved the world that God sent God's only beloved child to restore it." When we read John 3:16, we remember Jesus tells us that love is where God begins and ends. This love is the ultimate gift that we do nothing to deserve. Again and again, love is our Lenten and life refrain. Before we act, think, or believe – can love be our *first* go-to just like it is for God? *Again and Again, God loves first.*

Old Testament

[Numbers 21:3-7](#)

The book of Numbers describes the travels and fortunes of the people of Israel during their wilderness wandering period. In this story, the people grumbled despite God’s provision, so God sends poisonous snakes to bite them. Moses erects a bronze serpent pole and instructs anyone who is bitten to look upon the pole and live. Jesus draws from this imagery in his description of the Son of Man on the cross.

³The LORD listened to the voice of Israel, and handed over the Canaanites; and they utterly destroyed them and their towns; so the place was called Hormah.

⁴From Mount Hor they set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. ⁵The people spoke against God and against Moses, “Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food.” ⁶Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷The people came to Moses and said, “We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us.” So Moses prayed for the people.

New Testament

[John 3:14-21](#)

John 3:16 is the most recognizable verse in the New Testament. Jesus gives context for his crucifixion and saving of the world by recalling Moses in the desert.

After inviting Nicodemus to be born anew, Jesus tells him that God loved the world so much that God sent God’s only Beloved to restore and save it. Jesus speaks about his life, death, and resurrection.

¹⁴ And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵ that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. ¹⁶ “For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. ¹⁷ “Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸ Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹ And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰ For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. ²¹ But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God.”
